The History of Camp Edgewood and the Chapel Cross

The foundation for Camp Edgewood was in the late 1930's at Fishers' Glen on the shores of Lake Erie, between Port Dover and Turkey Point. Campers from St. Matthew's and my parents from Guelph and Preston, as staff, attended this camp whose location is still present and still named Fishers' Glen.

Camp Edgewood itself opened in Eden Mills near Guelph in 1944 and existed until 2017. Many Pastors, seminarians, staff, counsellors and campers (including many from St. Matthew's) enjoyed its natural beauty and Christ-centred programs at camps and retreats. Unfortunately, its closure was forced by a government department that insisted on a new central septic system that Synod could not afford.


The Camp was disbanded and sold in several parts, one of which became Edgewood Gardens/Jones Family Greens, a 12 acre organic farming operation. Another section was purchased by a group of Eden Mills' residents who created Edgewood Trails, a conservation area for the public and former campers.

Through a newspaper article, Farmer Matt Jones thoughtfully conveyed the information that two crosses remained on his site. The one cross he gave to his daughter to give to a friend who had been a camper; the other cross, the Chapel Cross, he made available to anyone who would like to have it. That cross had been dedicated to the memory of my Father, Rev. Norman Berner, one of the directors of the camp at Fishers' Glen and Edgewood. I made contact with Matt, and Norm and I went to Edgewood last October to pick up the cross.

The cross was lovingly refurbished by Rick Kiess, father of former camper, Adam, and skilfully mounted on our south wall by former camper and son, Jonathan McLeod, and his team to create a reflection of the cross behind it.
